Laying the Foundation: Our Vision for Sustainable Rural Communities

Rural-urban migration remains a pressing challenge. Despite progress, many rural youth still view cities as the primary source of opportunity. This underscores the urgency of creating viable rural livelihoods. Sustaining community-led projects beyond their initial phases continues to be difficult many small businesses and rural initiatives struggle without ongoing support. This confirms the importance of RuralRise's role in monitoring, evaluation, incubation and long-term support. Ensuring meaningful inclusion of youth not just as beneficiaries but as decision-makers requires constant effort, mentorship, and structural support. The documentary and civic workshops helped but more remains to be done.

RuralRise remains dedicated to empowering rural communities in Namibia ensuring that development is community-driven, sustainable, and aligned with national priorities. We work to reverse rural-urban migration by generating opportunities, building capacity, and fostering community-owned growth.

Through a combination of leadership and skills development, project incubation and support, policy advocacy, and community-owned initiatives, we aim to build self-reliant rural hubs that thrive on local innovation and resilience.



PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

“From the Ground Up” documentary screening with stakeholders, Windhoek, Namibia

On 14 March 2025, RuralRise hosted a pivotal dialogue and screening of its documentary From the Ground Up (FTGU) in Windhoek, bringing together approximately 50 key stakeholders, including policymakers, community leaders, and rural youth.

This event concluded the first phase of the FTGU policy sprint, funded by the European Union under the “New Voices, New Narratives” program.

The screening showcased stories from young people in Utuseb, Uis, and Okombahe (Erongo Region), highlighting their challenges, aspirations, and community contributions.

Rural Youth Network(RYN) Ambassadors featured bring Rural Voices to policy makers

We're proud to feature Rosy Khaxas from Utuseb (Erongo Region), one of the inspiring young voices spotlighted by RuralRise through the From the Ground Up (FTGU) project.

As a panelist during the documentary screening and dialogue and as a youth protagonist in the FTGU documentary. Rosy shared her hopes and vision for her community, including a heartfelt call for the establishment of a school in Utuseb so that young people there can complete full secondary education without having to relocate to urban areas.



During the dialogue, RuralRise facilitated discussions with representatives from the Ministry of Urban & Rural Development, the Ministry of Youth, Sport & National Service, the Namibian Police, and traditional leaders, centering rural youth concerns in policy conversations.

According to the project coordinator, **Victory April**, the goal was not only to amplify youth voices but also to connect them with opportunities to improve their livelihoods and influence policy.



POLICY BRIEFING MEETING WITH STAKEHOLDERS

19 March 2025, Hilton, Windhoek

As part of its ongoing commitment to strengthen rural-youth inclusion in national development, RuralRise convened a **Policy Briefing Meeting with key stakeholders** in Windhoek, on 19 March 2025. The gathering brought together representatives from government ministries, civil-society organizations, development partners, and youth leaders from various regions.


The purpose of the meeting was to formally present the findings, insights, and recommendations of the **From the Ground Up (FTGU) Policy Brief** and to create a platform for direct dialogue between rural youth and institutions responsible for shaping national policy.

During the session, RuralRise walked stakeholders through the realities young people face in rural Namibia: limited access to secondary education, gaps in service delivery, unemployment, lack of digital infrastructure, and insufficient channels for civic participation. Youth representatives shared firsthand experiences from communities such as Utuseb, Uis, Okombahe, and surrounding rural areas, giving the data in the Policy Brief a human voice.

The meeting marked a powerful moment of exchange one where communities and institutions met on equal ground to drive meaningful, inclusive discourse.


““FROM THE GROUND UP” documentary Screening and presentation

26 June 2025, U.S Embassy, Windhoek

In a landmark moment for RuralRise and the young people we serve, the **“From the Ground Up (FTGU)” documentary** was officially screened at the **U.S. Embassy in Windhoek**, a powerful recognition of the importance of amplifying rural voices in national and international spaces. The event brought together diplomats, development partners, civil-society organizations, and youth advocates to engage with the lived experiences, challenges, and hopes of Namibia’s rural young people.

The screening formed part of the Embassy’s commitment to supporting youth empowerment, inclusive development, and community-driven storytelling.

For many stakeholders, the documentary offered a rare, unfiltered look at the realities rural youth face daily, from limited educational access and unemployment to cultural resilience, innovation, and the desire for meaningful participation in national development.

Annual Rural Development Progress Review & Planning Workshop

At this year's Annual Rural Development Progress Review & Planning Workshop, participants were inspired by a powerful presentation from Ms. Eslien Tsuses, Founder & CEO of RuralRise. Her message was clear: Namibia's path to inclusive and sustainable development begins in its rural communities driven by its youth.

Ms. Tsuses highlighted the pressing challenges and untapped opportunities that define rural Namibia, from limited access to resources and skills development to the growing need for localized innovation. She emphasized that young people in rural areas are not merely beneficiaries of development; they are key actors who can drive economic growth, curb rural-urban migration, and build resilient local economies when given the right support.

A central focus of the presentation was RuralRise's flagship initiative, From the Ground Up (FTGU), an empowerment model designed to unlock grassroots potential. **FTGU equips rural youth with practical skills, entrepreneurial training, and community-driven problemsolving approaches that transform local livelihoods from within.**

Ms. Tsuses also showcased how strategic partnerships, mentorship opportunities, and incubation platforms are creating real impact helping young innovators move ideas into action, strengthening rural enterprises, and fostering long-term sustainability.

Importantly, the themes of the presentation align strongly with Namibia's Vision 2030, Harambee Prosperity Plan II, and the National Youth Policy II. Together, these frameworks offer a national roadmap toward equitable growth, and RuralRise's work exemplifies how grassroots initiatives can translate policy into meaningful progress on the ground. As Namibia works toward a more prosperous and inclusive future, this discussion underscored a vital truth: empowering rural youth is not only smart development it is nation-building.

YOUTH AND COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHTS

WHAT DOES RURAL EMPOWERMENT DO FOR YOUNG PEOPLE?

Nicolene Goses has been a powerful voice and mobiliser for rural youth in 2025 in her role as Civic Engagement Officer for the Okombahe Rural Youth Network. From early 2025, she focused on strengthening youth participation in civic life and raising critical issues that affect her community.

She played a central role in the From the Ground Up initiative, helping to organise and facilitate community dialogues that brought young people, traditional leaders, and policymakers together. **During a dialogue in Okombahe, Nicolene spotlighted one of the most urgent challenges in her community, teenage pregnancy urging for open conversation, comprehensive sexual education, and structural support for young girls to stay in school.**

Her engagement has not gone unnoticed beyond Okombahe. In April 2025, she participated in a **3-day civic capacity building workshop**, alongside our community liaison, **Issaskar Tjandero**, showing her commitment to continuously sharpen her advocacy skills.

Nicolene also took her rural youth leadership to a national platform: she featured on a panel at **YouthQuake 2025**, under the umbrella of the Namibia Media Trust, where she shared insights on the opportunities and systemic barriers facing rural youth entrepreneurs.

Her journey is a strong example of what happens when rural youth are given platforms: she didn't just participate she helped shape conversations, challenge norms, and demand inclusion. Through her work, she's building not only her own leadership capacity but also the collective power of Okombahe's youth network.

Through this platform, she championed the perspectives of Namibia's rural youth reinforcing our ongoing commitment to equity, representation, and community-driven development.




Eco Dialogue Collective Event, August 2025

We were honoured to participate in the **Eco Dialogue Collective Event**, a platform dedicated to strengthening public policy discourse in Namibia. The dialogue brought together journalists, civil-society organisations, youth groups, and community representatives to discuss issues of transparency, accountability, access to information, and community-driven governance.

Our **"From the Ground Up" documentary** was featured during the event, placing rural youth concerns and aspirations firmly at the centre of the national conversation. The screening sparked meaningful discussions on development, marginalisation, and the structural challenges rural communities continue to face, highlighting the importance of using storytelling as a tool for advocacy and social change.
